Where it becomes a problem is when we get so polarized in our thinking and our actions that we can't tolerate someone with an opposing view. Given time and rational debate, we can work out all of our issues. It's not YOU vs THEM. It's US working together. It's not how do we burn it down, it's how do we work to make it better?

Two things jump out at me. First off, membership is more important than ever. Unfortunately, as individual Hams and ARRL members, we have not placed enough emphasis on how important it is to belong. Right now there are some internal issues, but in the long term our threat to continued existence as a hobby (and a service to our community) is in greater jeopardy to external issues. "Numbers" are everything to the world in which we exist. (Those numbers can me measured in both membership and \$\$\$) Secondly, participation of our membership can resolve a lot of our issues, although time is required to see it through. ARRL membership has not taken its responsibility as a member seriously. (We are actually a subset of a much larger national "problem" with many of the same issues...) At ARRL, the Board of Directors is the ultimate entity that runs the show, and they are all elected by the membership. Yet, it's a very small percentage of the membership that even bothers to vote in any of the ARRL elections that take place! And it's also a small percentage of the membership that supports the organization with anything more than their annual dues.

I'm trying to be optimistic. I believe we have a lot of really smart people in our hobby. I believe we have a lot of really good people who all want the best for our hobby. I believe that we will resolve the issues we have, but we can't accomplish it when the majority are apathetic.

Those are my opinions, you're welcome to disagree with me. We can still be friends and work together for the good of Amateur Radio. The Greatest Hobby in the World!

Message to US Educators Amateur Radio on the International Space Station Contact Opportunity

Call for Proposals
New Proposal Window is January 8, 2024–February 29, 2024

January 8, 2024 --- The Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) Program is seeking formal and informal education institutions and organizations, individually or working together, to host an Amateur Radio contact with a crew member onboard the ISS. ARISS anticipates that the contacts would be held between **July 1, 2024** and **December 31, 2024**. Crew scheduling and ISS orbits will determine exact contact dates. To maximize these radio contact opportunities, ARISS is looking for organizations that will draw large numbers of participants and integrate the contact into a well-developed education plan.

The deadline to submit a proposal is February 29, 2024. Proposal information and more details such as expectations, proposal guidelines and the proposal form can be found at www.ariss.org. An ARISS Introductory Webinar session will be held January 17, 2024 at 7 PM ET. The Zoom link to sign up is: https://ws06web.zoom.us/meeting/register/tZcrc-qsrD0pGNLBvhR_2p509uTeRz00u4Sw.

The Opportunity

Crew members aboard the International Space Station will participate in scheduled ARISS amateur radio contacts. These radio contacts are approximately 10 minutes in length and allow students to interact with the astronauts through a question-and-answer session.

An ARISS contact is a voice communication opportunity via amateur radio between astronauts

and cosmonauts aboard the space station and classrooms and communities. ARISS contacts afford education audiences the opportunity to learn firsthand from astronauts what it is like to live and work in space and to learn about space research conducted on the ISS. Students also will have an opportunity to learn about satellite communication, wireless technology, and radio science. Because of the nature of human spaceflight and the complexity of scheduling activities aboard the ISS, organizations must demonstrate flexibility to accommodate changes in dates and times of the radio contact.

Amateur radio organizations around the world with the support of NASA and space agencies in Russia, Canada, Japan and Europe present educational organizations with this opportunity. The ham radio organizations' volunteer efforts provide the equipment and operational support to enable communication between crew on the ISS and students around the world using amateur radio.

Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) is a cooperative venture of international amateur radio societies and the space agencies that support the International Space Station (ISS). In the United States, sponsors are the American Radio Relay League (ARRL), Amateur Radio Digital Communications (ARDC), Radio Amateur Satellite Corporation (AMSAT), NASA's Space Communications and Navigation program (SCaN) and the ISS National Lab—Space Station Explorers. The primary goal of ARISS is to promote exploration of science, technology, engineering, the arts, and mathematics topics. ARISS does this by organizing scheduled contacts via amateur radio between crew members aboard the ISS and students. Before and during these radio contacts, students, educators, parents, and communities take part in hands-on learning activities tied to space, space technologies, and amateur radio. ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program

Clubs around the country sponsor VE sessions in order to help new hams get their licenses and to help existing hams upgrade. One of the changes in the last couple of years if the introduction of the \$35 FCC License Fee. The ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program, in effect since April 19, 2022, will cover the one-time \$35 application fee for new license candidates younger than 18-years old for tests administered under the ARRL VEC program.

The \$35 FCC application fee will be reimbursed after the ARRL VEC receives the completed reimbursement form and after the new license has been issued by the FCC. The reimbursement check will be mailed to the fee payer. Also, candidates who are under the age of 18 pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VEC VE team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates under the age of 18, regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of age is required at the session. Visit www.arrl.org/youth-licensing-grant-program for the program instructions and reimbursement form.

Contact <u>ARRL VEC</u> for assistance or for information on how your club can set up an ARRL VEC VE team and offer testing on a regular basis in your area, and how to take advantage of the reduced exam fee for youth candidates. It's extremely gratifying when a candidate passes their test and earns a license.

Live Launch Coverage: NASA's Northrop Grumman CRS-20


NASA, Northrop Grumman, and SpaceX are targeting 12:29 p.m. EST on Monday, Jan. 29, for

the next launch to deliver science investigations and supplies to the International Space Station. This launch is the 20th Northrop Grumman commercial resupply services mission to the orbital laboratory for the agency.

The Cygnus spacecraft is scheduled to remain at the space station until May, when it will depart the orbiting laboratory, at which point it will harmlessly burn up in the Earth's atmosphere. This spacecraft is named the S.S. Patricia "Patty" Hilliard Robertson after the former NASA astronaut.

Live launch coverage will begin at 12:15 p.m. EST.

HamSCI 2024 Workshop

Ham Radio Science Citizen Investigation (<u>HamSCI</u>) will hold its sixth annual workshop on March 22 - 23, 2024, at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. The event is meant to bring together the amateur radio community and professional scientists.



The 2024 workshop's theme will be "Alignments" - specifically those between the Sun, Moon, and Earth; collegiate amateur radio recreation and science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) curricula; data collection and analysis, and professional and citizen science. Workshop participants will prepare for the solar eclipse taking place on April 8, 2024, which will be seen in totality from Cleveland.

HamSCI's main interest is using amateur radio for the characterization and study of ionospheric phenomena like traveling ionospheric disturbances, sporadic E, solar flares, geomagnetic storms, the 2024 total solar eclipse, and other space weather events. To facilitate this science, continued development of the HamSCI Personal Space Weather Station and discussion about integrating amateur radio into the collegiate curriculum will also take place during the workshop.

Registration is now open, and the deadline is March 1, 2024. HamSCI is also accepting presentations relating to amateur radio and science -- particularly space and atmospheric science, space weather, and radio astronomy -- that analyze the ionosphere, propose ideas for the Personal Space Weather Station, and discuss the 2024 eclipse.

Presentations should be the form of talks, posters, lightning talks, and demonstrations. The Science Program Committee will be accepting abstracts and presentations.

If you would like to present, please submit your abstract by February 10, 2024. Presenters will be notified about their acceptance by March 1, 2024. Questions about abstracts should be emailed to Nathaniel Frissell, W2NAF, at hamsci@hamsci.org.

It is now an FCC requirement to have an FCC FRN; active email address and active phone number before taking any exam. Please bring your FCC FRN, original license, a copy of your license (if a licensed ham), a valid photo ID and \$15.00 - Cash preferred.

Effective April 19, 2022, the FCC will charge a \$35.00 application fee for amateur radio licenses. The fee will apply to new, renewal, rule waiver, and modification applications that request a new vanity call sign. License upgrades will not have a fee applied. The fee will be per application. *VE's will not collect the fees at exam sessions*.

You can find it by Googling "NCVEC quick-form 605" and clicking on the url for a pdf of the form. Please note **the FCC requires you to provide a FRN** (FCC Registration Number). Social Security Numbers are no longer accepted. If you are new to ham radio and don't have a FRN, Google "New FRN" and follow the fcc.gov link.

If you are currently licensed, be sure to **bring a copy of your license to the exam.** The cost of the exam itself is \$15.00, and if you wish to pay by check, it should be made out to the ARRL/VEC. Identification with your picture is also necessary, such as a driver's license. If you have any questions, please contact Scott Farnham, KO8O, at (440) 256-0320, or scottfarnham@roadrunner.com

In addition to the \$15 test fee, the FCC now charges \$35 to add you to the Amateur Radio database. The FCC will e-mail successful candidates instructions for payment directly to them. Payment must be made within 10 days of the e-mail. This charge does not apply to upgrades.

This week we will continue our investigation of the various CQ Zones. So, lets get started.

Zones 12, 13, and 14

Zones 12,13, and 14 are the Southwest Zone of South America, Southeast Zone of South America, and the Western Zone of Europe. Following is a breakout of the entities that are contained in those.

Zone 12. Southwest Zone of South America: CE (Chile), CE0 (Easter Is.), CE0(Juan Fernandez Is.), CE0 (San Felix Is.), 3Y (Peter I) and some Antarctic stations.

Zone 13. Southeast Zone of South America: CX (Uruguay), LU (Argentina), VP8 Falklands, VP8 South Georgia, VP8 South Orkney, VP8 South Shetlands, VP8 South Sandwich and some Antarctic stations.

Zone 14. Western Zone of Europe: C3 (Andorra), CT (Portugal), CU (Azores Is.), DL (Germany), EA (Spain), EA6 (Balearic Is.), El (Ireland), F (France), G (England), GD (Isle of Man), GI (Northern Ireland), GJ (Jersey), GM (Scotland), GU (Guernsey), GW (Wales), HB (Switzerland), HB0(Liechtenstein), LA (Norway), LX (Luxembourg), ON (Belgium), OY (Faroe Is.), OZ (Denmark), PA (Netherlands), SM (Sweden), ZB (Gibraltar), 3A (Monaco) and 4U1ITU (ITU, Geneva).

These zones have been "feast or famine" for me. For each zone area there are several entities that are very common and there is at least one that is rare.

In Zone 12, I was very lucky to work 3Y0PI, Peter Island, in 1994. The last DXPedition to operate from Peter Island was in 2006.

Zone 13 has some of the most available entities and the rarest. The VP8 group is usually only workable during a DXPedition.

Zone 14 also has a few challenges with the Gx group (GD, GM, GU), ZB – Gibraltar, and 3A – Monaco. I have worked well into the upper hundreds of hams in this zone, but, only one 3A!

Here is an update from Bernie, W3UR, of the DailyDX and the WeeklyDX, and the How's DX Column in QST. The DailyDX the best source for real-time DX information. http://www.dailydx.com/. Bernie has this to report:

TX5S, Clipperton Island is On the air for real!

Daytime temperatures are over 90 degrees Fahrenheit (32 degrees Celsius), but the TX5S team made nearly 12,000 QSOs in its first full day on Clipperton Island. As of January 21, local time, they still had additional setup to do, including low band antennas and "the big amps." Says K5GS, Gene, "It's difficult to work in the blazing hot sun, so we go slow to avoid heat-related medical issues."

Gene also says that the log to date was uploaded to Club Log and to MØURX.com. "There were some discrepancies between [Club Log] Live Stream when we first came up; we had a software glitch that was resolved. I am still working on the satellite log and hope to have it uploaded soon." He asks that DXers not send messages to team members' personal email addresses, to the DXpedition address, or directly to the PayPal email address. Also, he notes that many people are sending log screenshots, spreadsheets, and other files. These messages and their attachments are being deleted immediately.

Finally, they are not using QRZ.com logging, so please do not send requests for same. "We are **not** making log corrections while on the island," says Gene. "All busted calls and not-in-log issues will be resolved by submitting the form on the MØURX Bespoke OQRS application. Use the Groups.io account to contact us; the pilots will summarize your comments and send to us."

As a reminder, K6TU, Stu, and DH3WO, Wolfgang, have made available propagation tools.

N3QE, Tim, cites on Facebook a Club Log white list that chronicles the history of Clipperton DXpeditions from 1954 to the present. This list is shown at right.

The EIDX Group has confirmed March 20-29 as the dates for their upcoming DXpedition to **7P**, **Lesotho**. Thirteen operators will be QRV as 7P8EI and will operate up to eight stations on 160-10M CW, SSB, and digital modes. QSL via MØOXO OQRS. They will have a website up soon.

N8JTR, Jay, is vacationing on **St. Kitts and Nevis**, using the callsign V47TT when he can. He terms this a "tiny outing." Starting next here, he will be there for three years; "that will be a lot of operating."

He will be on CW and FT8 from "the Brimstone Fortress and the volcano crater" using an ICOM IC-705 and Wolf River at 10W into a telescoping whip antenna, most likely on 20 and 15M. His QSL mailing address is on QRZ.com; he will also upload his log there and to POTA whenever he activates a park. He is waiting for his LoTW certificate and having QSL cards printed. Says Jay, "I'm kind of new to being DX instead of working it!"

Activity from **South Sudan** will be on hold for a bit. Z81D, Diya, aka YI1DZ, left two days ago for two weeks at his home in Istanbul, visiting family. When he's back in Juba he plans SSB and FT8 on the air until his contract in Juba ends, at the end of May. He may extend another half year.

We have 2 hams making a Pacific tour:

First, YT1AD, Hrane and team will be active between February 8 and March1 from **Fiji, Samoa and Tonga** but not from Tokelau (ZK3) as previously announced. The ZK3 operation is being postponed for late 2024 or early 2025. "The reason is New Zealand's state activities on the island of Tokelau in February and March, which have PRIORITY!!", says Hrane. More details on the delayed ZK3 activity are expected.

The team members going to 3D2, 5W and A3 include RC9O, Anatoliy; UA9OYL, Olga; YU3AA, Stevan; and YT1AD, Hrane, all with their own individual callsigns.

The Second tour will be made by Bill, G0VDE. Bill will be traveling to the Pacific between August 31 and September 23. His first stop will be to Pitcairn Island where he will be operating as VP6WR from September 5-15. Next, he is on to Mangareva Island, French Polynesia as FO/G0VDE from

September 17 to 21. He'll have an IC-705 and IC-7300 along with a Juma PA1000 amplifier. Vertical and wire antennas will be used.

Listen for him on SSB, FT8 and some CW. He will have the ability to operate on 3.5 through 28 MHz, depending on propagation. He is currently working on QSL Manager arrangements and preparing a website.

OE3GEA, Gerhard, should be QRV by now from **Senegal** and will stay until February 4. This will be a holiday style operation as 6W/OE3GEA. He will be operating in his spare time.

JG8NQJ, Take, is back at the weather station on **Minami Torishima** and will be QRV in his spare time as JG8NQJ/JD1. He planned to be active on CW and some FT8 on 17 and 15 meters. 

Print an Official or Unofficial Copy of Your Amateur Radio License

As of February 17, 2015, the **FCC no longer routinely issues paper license documents** to Amateur Radio applicants and licensees. The Commission has maintained for some time now that the official Amateur Radio license authorization is the electronic record that exists in its Universal Licensing System (ULS). The FCC will continue to provide paper license documents to all licensees who notify the Commission that they prefer to receive one.

Licensees also will be able to print out an official authorization — as well as an unofficial "reference copy" — from the ULS License Manager. I've created a set of instructions on how you can request an "official" printed copy of your license*
