### 2024 ARRL FIELD DAY



The theme for 2024 ARRL Field Day is "Be Radio Active." The event will run on June 22 - 23, and it will be one-part contest, one-part emergency communications exercise, and one-part open house -- and a great time. The theme encourages radio amateurs to take advantage of the peak of Solar Cycle 25, which we are nearing.

Activity this year is likely to be extremely high thanks to favorable solar conditions. The upper HF bands, such as 15 and 10 meters, should benefit most from the Cycle's peak. –*From ARRL Letter, March 14*, 2024

### ARMED FORCES DAY



# **CROSSBAND TEST**

The US Department of Defense will host this year's Armed Forces Day (AFD) Crossband Test on May 11, 2024. For more than 50 years, military and amateur stations have taken part in this event, which is an interoperability exercise between hobbyist and government radio stations. The event is open to all licensed amateur radio operators and will not impact any public or private communications. The AFD Crossband Test is a unique opportunity to test twoway communications between military communicators and radio stations in the Amateur Radio Service (ARS), as authorized in 47 CFR 97.111. These tests provide opportunities and challenges for radio operators to demonstrate individual technical skills in a tightly controlled exercise scenario. Military stations will transmit on selected military frequencies and announce the specific ARS frequencies monitored. All scheduled times will be in Zulu (Z), and all scheduled frequencies will be upper sideband (USB) unless otherwise noted. Information on frequencies, times, and other technical information can be found at DoD MARS - Armed Forces Day.

Information for QSL cards and contact information is available at <u>Armed Forces</u> Day QSL request form.

AFD is classified as an observance -- not a federal holiday. It will be celebrated on Saturday, May 18, 2024, and it will be a time of honor. The establishment of AFD was first announced on August 31, 1949, by then US Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson. It was meant to replace the separate Army, Navy, and Air Force Days. All branches were combined to create the US Department of Defense. The first Armed Forces Day was held on May 20, 1950. The day is celebrated with special events, tributes, observances, and parades. –*From ARRL Letter April 18*, 2024

# GOLDEN SPIKE 155<sup>th</sup> SES

To celebrate the 155<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the driving of the Golden Spike, a ceremony that celebrated the completion of the transcontinental railroad, the Ogden Amateur Radio Club (OARC) will operate special event station W7G on May 10 - 11, 2024. Operating hours for both days will be 1500Z - 2300Z (09:00 -17:00 MDT) on single sideband on 7.235 MHz, 14.255 MHz, 21.330 MHz, and 28.385 MHz. There may be CW operation on 7.040 MHz and 14.040 MHz. The special event station will be located at the Golden Spike National Historical Park in Promontory Summit, Utah. During last year's 2-day celebration, OARC made approximately 300 contacts. # 13 COLONIES SPECIAL EVENT

The event honors the 13 original British colonies that rebelled against Great Britain and founded the United States of America in July 1776. The event will use all amateur radio frequencies and modes, and it runs from July 1 to 7, 2024. During this time, there will be special event stations on the air corresponding to each of the 13 colonies, in addition to two bonus stations with 1 x 1 call signs. ### LEWIS & CLARK TRAIL OTA

The third annual Lewis and Clark Trail on the Air will be active from June 1 - 16. This special event is an on-air activity that commemorates the historic <u>Lewis</u> and <u>Clark National Historic Trail</u>, which covers 4,900 miles through 16 states,

including the disembarkation from Camp Dubois and what is referred to as the Eastern Legacy. The event is sponsored by the Clark County Amateur Radio Club (CCARC), W7AIA, with support and participation from various clubs in all 16 states along the historic trail. Each day of the event runs for 24, hours and the start time is 0000 UTC through 2400 UTC. Operating modes include SSB phone, FM phone, CW, and FT8. Any combination of modes toward working all 16 states is allowed. A schedule for planned operations for each participating state will be posted on the CCARC website. Certificates can be requested for two classes of participation: the Expedition Partner Certificate (awarded to any station working all 16 states) and the Trail Companion Certificate (awarded to any station working one or more states). The National WWI Museum and Memorial in Kansas City, Missouri, will activate WW1USA from Friday, May 24 until Monday, May 27, 2024. Amateur radio operators are invited to participate in this special event and contact stations around the world. Amateurs are also welcome to serve as guest operators of WW1USA at any time and receive a special amateur radio operator certificate. QSL with WW1USA will be available by mail with a SASE or other postage provided, or via an eOSL. After the event, information will be provided regarding how to request a commemorative certificate. WW1USA operation dates often coincide with other events held at the museum and memorial, highlighting lessons from the first worldwide war. The station helps to raise awareness of the Great War and how it continues to affect the world today. By now I'm sure you've all heard the news regarding MFJ. I'm including the ARRL release here as a testimony to MFJ's history and legacy:

MFJ Enterprises, Inc founder Martin F. Jue, K5FLU, announced that as of May 17, 2024, the company will cease on-site production at their Starkville, Mississippi, facility. Ameritron, Hy-Gain, Cushcraft, Mirage, and Vectronics brand products will be affected by the shutdown.

In a letter posted to social media, Jue said he is looking forward to retiring. Times have changed since I started this business 52 years ago. Our product line grew and grew and prospered. Covid changed everything [for] businesses, including ours. It was the hardest hit that we have ever had, and we never fully recovered. I turned 80 this year. I had never really considered retirement, but life is so short, and my time with my family is so precious.

Jue founded MFJ Enterprises in 1972, after building a CW filter kit that sold for less than \$10. Since 1990, the company has acquired several other legacy brands within the amateur radio market. Jue shared that the company will remain open to sell existing inventory because they have "a lot of stock on hand." They will also continue to offer repair services for the foreseeable future.

Jue expressed gratitude to the many longtime employees of MFJ, some of whom have been with the company for 40 years. He also thanked MFJ dealers and radio amateurs for their patronage over the decades.

He also sent a special message to ARRL Members, and loyal QST readers:
"I give my deepest heartfelt thank you to my fellow hams all over the world and especially to ARRL members and QST readers. In my youth, I was given a second-hand set of 1958 QSTs. I read them over and over until I practically memorized every word. This gave seed to MFJ.

MFJ became a worldwide ham radio leader only because of you. As I turned 80, I cannot thank you all enough for 52 wonderful ham radio years. Thank you, 73s . . . Martin F. Jue, k5flu"



Whatever you think of MFJ and their products, they held a prominent role in the Amateur Radio world for over 50 years. They will be missed by many. I hope that some of their product lines might be picked up by others and continue to be offered to the Amateur Radio community.

MFJ provided a very wide range of products, and many of those products were the "pieces / parts" that every ham needs for his station and operation. I would encourage some younger hams among us to consider the idea of filling the void that MFJ leaves in the availability of all the different kinds of products they offered. # HAMVENTION 2024 AWARD WINNERS

Special Achievement Award Anthony Luscre, K8ZT



Anthony Luscre, K8ZT, is from near Akron, OH and was first licensed in 1981. He has been a QRP operator, contester, and teacher throughout his career in amateur radio. He updated to Amateur Extra in 2000. Anthony is active on HF and VHF/UHF, using CW, phone, and digital. His QRP contacts now top 115,000. He has consistently finished in the top ten of various major contests and finished first in the World and US in both CQ Worldwide Phone and CW QRP categories multiple times. As a bonus, his QRP DXCC total recently topped the 328 mark, and he has completed 11-band WAS.

Between licensing classes, club programs, webinars, hamfests, conferences, youth & school radio demonstrations and other in-person and online talks, Anthony has presented over 500 sessions since the beginning of COVID-19. He has presented multiple times for Contest University, QSO Today Expo, and at Dayton Hamvention. He does a weekly class, "The Joy of Operating," for the Long Island CW Club. Anthony serves as ARRL Ohio Section Youth Coordinator and is an officer in his local radio club. He enjoys writing as well as speaking and has prepared articles for a variety of publications, including CO Magazine (column "Ham Radio Explorer"), DX Engineering blog "On All Bands" and developing an online course "Introduction to Contesting" for the ARRL Learning Network.

# Technical Achievement Ward Silver NOAX

For the past 15 years Ward has been the Lead Editor of the ARRL Handbook and the ARRL Antenna Book, and a primary author of all three ARRL License Manuals and study guides from 2004

until his retirement in 2023. He wrote the well-received "Grounding and Bonding for the Radio Amateur" (now in its 2nd edition) and "Ham Radio for Dummies" (now in its 4th edition). His monthly QST column, "Hands-On Radio" ran for 180 issues and has now been published in book format. The recent ARRL book, "Here to There: Radio Wave Propagation" includes his contributions including being its editor. He gives many online and in-person presentations and is a two-time recipient of the Bill Orr Technical Writing Award, as well. An electrical engineer, he designed microprocessor-based products and medical devices for twenty years before beginning a second career as a teacher and writer. Licensed since 1972, he is a co-founder of the World Radiosport Team Championships, and was inducted into the CQ Contest Hall of Fame in 2015, with numerous top scores and records. He is President of the Yasme Foundation (yasme.org) and is also a board member of the HamSCI collaborative research group (hamsci.org). Ward's primary interests in amateur radio include radiosport, antenna design, and supporting his local emergency response team.

# Amateur of The Year Edward Engleman KG8CX

Edward Engleman, KG8CX, is from Menominee, Michigan. He is the cofounder of the Young Amateurs Communications Ham Team (YACHT). Ed was first licensed in 1991 and reached Amateur Extra class in 2000. He has been a member of the ARRL since 1991. He serves his home club, the Marinette & Menominee Amateur Radio Club, as a VE. Ed's background as an elementary educator and principal for 33 years was instrumental in developing the talents he now uses in his work with young amateurs. His major objective is to help create and develop enjoyment and skill in communications/technology via ham radio activity through its many modes, and to encourage friendships with other youth hams. Membership in YACHT, callsign K8KDZ, has grown steadily. There were 47 new members in 2023 alone.

Many of the YACHT youth have given presentations at past Hamvention® and Hamcation youth forums conducted by Carole Perry. A number of the youth members have been awarded national recognition for their ham radio activity and accomplishments. # **Guernsey ARES® Tornado Siren Test**

On Wednesday, March 20, Guernsey County ARES® was involved with the annual statewide tornado siren test. The sirens were to sound at 9:50AM, So, I began a net at 9:40AM. Stations checked in and reported their locations.

After the tornado siren test, each participating station checked back into the net and reported whether or not he/she can hear a tornado siren(s). I also asked participants if they received a test tornado warning by phone, text, WX radio, or some other means. I then asked each participant for a weather report and a field situation report (using templates provided for use by the participants that were emailed the preceding day).

# Here are the templates used by the participants:

Weather report template: Call sign / Location / Temp F / Wind speed and direction / Barometric pressure / Sky cover / precipitation last 24 hours / severe weather or damage noted.

**Field Situation report template**: Each participant was to give his/her call sign and then say Line 1 Yes, No, or Unk(nown), etc.

Line 1 Do you have power?

Line 2 Do you have gas?

Line 3 Do you have water?

Line 4 Landline telephone working?

Line 5 Cell phone voice working?

Line 6 Cell phone text working?

Line 7 Internet working?

Line 8 Television OTA working?

Line 9 Television cable working?

Line 10 FM commercial broadcast working?

Line 11 AM commercial broadcast working?

Line 12 NOAA WX working? End

Notice the use of "Line number" for each value. There are a lot of values in this report. All of the values are either yes, no, or unknown. Without line numbers it would be easy to corrupt the report. Notice only the values are given in both reports. This is done to limit airtime and move traffic efficiently. For this to work, all operators must have, use, and understand the templates.

After the drill, during the critique several participants noted that some of the questions did not apply to their situation and stated that perhaps a N/A not applicable notation be used in some cases. This would suggest that they had no knowledge because they were unable to answer the question.

### **Results of Siren Test**

Members in Norwich/New Concord area were able to hear their local sirens; however, there was a glitch in the Cambridge area. Some sirens did not go off until 10:10 am.

# AMATEUR RADIO SAVES FAMILY IN DEATH VALLEY NATIONAL PARK

Death Valley National Park is in a remote desert in southern California, where mobile phone networks are spotty at best. On Saturday, April 6, a radio amateur and his family were enjoying the park when their vehicle became stuck in mud in a dangerous area. Without access to a cell network, the ham called for help on the 10-meter band.

According to a news release from the Black Swamp Amateur Radio Club, Caleb Gustwiller, KD8TGB, jumped into action. He was monitoring from Ohio when he picked up the distress call. He

was able to hear the call sign and the general location of the ham in distress. He lost the signal to the noise, so he wrote a post in the Parks on the Air® Facebook group asking for other hams to listen for the calls.

Several hams contacted emergency officials in southern California, which led to the ham and their family being rescued within a few hours by park rangers. The club stated in their Facebook post: "Without Caleb hearing this distress call, it could have quickly become a very deadly situation for the operator and his family." –*From Ohio Section Journal Post Script April 15*, 2024

# FCC REQUIRES TWO FACTOR AUTHENTIFICATION FOR CORES USERS

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has announced an upcoming change to the Commission Registration System (CORES) that licensees use to pay any application or regulatory fees, manage or reset a password on an existing FRN, or request a new FRN. Beginning March 29, 2024, multifactor authentication will be implemented. Users will be prompted to request a six-digit secondary verification code, which will be sent to the email address(es) associated with each username. The user will then need to enter the code into CORES before they can continue.

In a <u>public notice</u>, the FCC said this change will make the system more secure. "This additional layer of security will further safeguard against unauthorized access, thereby enhancing the overall integrity of information contained within the CORES system and improving the security of user data," it read.

The FCC recommends that users confirm they have access to their username account email and to add a secondary email address, if need be.

# HISTORY OF WEBE BROADCAST STATION IN CAMBRIDGE, OHIO

Submitted by Lyn Alfman, N8IMW WEBE, owned and operated by Roy Waller, 8CL, was the first broadcast station in southeastern Ohio. Waller was granted a broadcast license July 8, 1924.

According to an article in *The Jeffersonian* dated Friday, August 1, 1924, noted the following: The wireless broadcasting station W.E.B.E. (Waller's Evening Broadcast Entertainers) established and maintained by Roy Waller at his home on North Forth Street, will broadcast an interesting program between 7 PM and 8:30 PM Friday evening. One week ago (Friday, July 25, 1924) the first program was broadcast in Cambridge and was received by a large number of radio fans in southeastern Ohio, including Cambridge.

According to *The Jeffersonian* dated August 8, 1924, WEBE, broadcasting from the Roy Waller home on North Fourth Street, will air a program Friday evening consisting of musical features and an address by Rev. C. J. Morton, pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church. Orchestra music, including popular hits, will be presented by the Imperial Orchestra, a piano solo by Bessie May Combs, age 10 years, and vocal solos by Bernie Singer. Each succeeding week brought more diverse entertainment from Cambridge, Byesville, and Zanesville, including local market reports, candidate interviews, and sports scores. The station served five counties in southeastern Ohio.

When it came time to renew the station's license (July 1928), Roy had to plea for renewal because the FCC called it the "Bedroom Station" because when it was established, it was located in a bedroom of his North Fourth Street home.

Although at the time of renewal, it was located in the Central National Bank building. The FCC Chairman Robinson noted that the home-built transmitting apparatus had no wave meter for frequency check and that the transmitter "was assembled of parts of a questionable

nature." Station WEBE operated under 10 watts, giving it an approximately 35 miles, and it was in theory that the station was not sufficiently strong to interfere with the programs broadcast by the larger stations. Robinson stated since the facilities in this area were inadequate and that if it were shown WEBW was serving the public interest, it would be relicensed.

According to *The Zanesville Signal* dated November 22, 1929, the removal of radio station WEBW Cambridge to Zanesville and its operation here by the Spence Music Company, will be effective within three weeks. The new call letters were WALR (short for the owner Waller or we all like records).

WALR began operating on May 25, 1930. Later it came under the direction of the Cleveland Radio Broadcasting Corporation, owners and operators of Radio Station WJAY in Cleveland. In 1940, WALR was sold and with the affiliation with National Broadcasting Corporation, took the call letters WHIZ.

# **BOB HEIL, K9EID**



The man who defined the sound of live rock 'n' roll music and brought audio engineering principals into mainstream amateur radio use, Dr. Bob Heil, K9EID, has passed away at the age of 83. He was an ARRL Life Member and in the ARRL Maxim Society.

Heil founded Heil Sound in 1966, through which he created the template for modern concert sound systems for musicians like the Grateful Dead, The Who, Joe Walsh, and Peter Frampton.

The talk box used on iconic live record *Frampton Comes Alive!* was Heil's design. His audio engineering products have been featured in the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, and he was honored in 2007 with the Parnelli Audio Innovator Award for his impact on the live sound industry.


Parallel to his commercial and artistic success in live music, was his passion for amateur radio. He was active in ham radio from a young age, and he merged his expertise in audio engineering with his love for radio. Heil Ham Radio was founded to produce microphones, headsets, and other gear for radio amateurs with an emphasis on high-quality audio.

Heil was known as a mentor who enjoyed helping others find success in ham radio. Heil was a generous donor to amateur radio organizations, including ARRL. Recently, he donated a host of new audio gear to the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station, W1AW.

Heil was known for his passion for AM operations. He served for many years as an on-camera host of the Ham Nation podcast. Tributes to Heil have been flooding social media, including from his co-hosts.

# FOOD CORNER



Frozen meatballs are very versatile or a great thing to have in your freezer to prepare a quick great tasting meal or as an appetizer.

# **MEATBALL STUFFED SHELLS Ingredients**

18 jumbo pasta shells
18 frozen meatballs
1 cup Ricotta cheese
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
1/3 cup Parmesan cheese
1 egg
2 cups marinara sauce (divided)
pinch salt and pepper

### **Directions**

- Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- Cook shells in boiling water as directed. Whisk Ricotta, (1/4 cup) Parmesan, egg, salt, and pepper in a bowl.
- Spread marinara sauce in a 9x13-inch baking dish.

- Stuff 1 tablespoon of Ricotta mixture and 1 meatball into each cooked and slightly cooled shell.
- Arrange in the baking dish, open side up.
- Top pasta shells with 1 cup of the marinara sauce and 1/3 Parmesan cheese.
- Cover with foil. Bake 30 minutes. Uncover; bake for 10 minutes more.

Recipe serves 6. Serving size is 3 stuffed shells.

# MEATBALL MINESTRONE Ingredients

4 cups water

16 – 18 freezer meatballs

1 15-ounce can of great northern beans

1 tablespoon instant beef bouillon granules

1 tablespoon minced dried onion

1 teaspoon dried basil, crushed

1 large bay leaf

½ of a 7-ounc package of spaghetti, broken into 2-inch pieces

1 16-ounce can mixed vegetables, drained


1 16-ounce can tomatoes, cut up grated Parmesan cheese
