Even before I got my Novice license I built one, and was practicing my code speed on it. It was great. When I got my Novice ticket I then graduated up and had to have a rig to go with that keyer, so my brother and I built a HeathKit HW-101. I was so proud of that rig. I talked, using code



of course, all over the world with it. I even got my Worked All States (WAS) as a novice using that keyer.

Well my friends, as time went on and the rigs got fancier and more sophisticated, why they even had the keyer and digital display built in to them! So, as fate would have it, I soon decided to go modern and sell off all of the old HeathKit equipment that I had built over the years.

Now here's where it gets interesting. The fellow that I sold the rig to didn't want the keyer. He was a straight key guy and didn't need to be bothered with any fancy key that had 2 paddles to it. So, I ended up selling the keyer to a friend of mine that sold it off to another person who sold it off to another and so on.... Well, you get the idea, and you would have thought that this would have been the end of this story.

Well my friends, it isn't! Several months ago, a good friend and fellow ham, Don, W8UMH had become a silent key. The club that he was now a member of was helping out and selling his estate for his wife. Wouldn't you know it, he had a HeathKit Keyer! So, I spoke up one day to several of the folks selling the equipment and said that I would be interested in purchasing the keyer. Well, that's where we left it until I got a phone call one afternoon from one of the newer hams here in the Mansfield area, Norm, KE8HLN that had purchased some of Don's estate. He asked me if I could do him a favor and pick it up and deliver some equipment he had purchased from the estate sale and deliver it to him at the upcoming Mansfield club meeting that evening. I agreed and did just that. But, when I discovered what he had purchased, you guessed it, it was the keyer that I was looking at, I teased him about buying the keyer out from under me when I delivered it to him that night.

Several days had elapsed after delivering the equipment to Norm, when I got a phone call from him. He called to ask me if I would want to buy the keyer from him. He told me that he really didn't feel he needed it after all, since his rig had a keyer built in. Sound familiar? So, I grabbed it up.

Once I got it home, I played with it for a while. It felt funny, and I know that may sound odd to some of you, but it didn't have the feel that was so famous for the HeathKit Keyer, and what I had remembered from the past. Yes, we fellow CW'ers do have a "FIST", and it's very recognizable. Just ask anyone that has done CW for a while, they will definitely tell you that your "fist" is as recognizable as your voice is. It felt like it just didn't have any tension on the paddles. So, I decided to venture inside the box and quickly discovered that the tensioning screw and spring were missing. Well, I thought, no wonder it didn't feel right! Some of the most important parts of the keyer were missing. Now, one thing that is very good about HeathKit equipment is that it was made from common parts! Things that you can still buy from the hardware store. So, I went down to my local hardware store and picked up the proper screw and tensioning spring that I felt would give me the tension that I wanted on the paddles, and scurried back home to assemble it. I got it all assembled and yup by golly, I now had the feel that I remembered.



After I got it all working like I wanted, I decided that I had better open up the bottom of the keyer to make sure that there wasn't anything else missing or possibly damaged. And that's when I discovered it!!! There, in the lower left corner of the chassis was something that brought tears to my eyes. It was my initials scribed into the metal frame, something that I done on every piece of equipment that I had built.

My keyer, it had come home! After all these years and all those other hams out there pounding out CW on it. It's now back with me!

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Shack Safety

Over the past several months we have discussed how to properly install, repair and even change out some of your electrical outlets, switches and lights. Now I want to discuss something that we don't always think about, because if your shack is like mine, this little cylindrical helper usually gets shoved to the corner and completely forgotten about. What am I talking about? Your Fire Extinguisher! You do have one in the shack, don't you?

I do want to discuss some of the differences in them and what each does for you.

Here is a basic answer from Fire Extinguisher: 101:

- <u>Class A</u> extinguishers are for ordinary combustible materials such as paper, wood, cardboard, and most plastics. The numerical rating on these types of extinguishers indicates the amount of water it holds and the amount of fire it can extinguish. Geometric symbol (green triangle)
- <u>Class B</u> fires involve flammable or combustible liquids such as gasoline, kerosene, grease and oil. The numerical rating for class B extinguishers indicates the approximate number of square feet of fire it can extinguish. Geometric symbol (red square)
- <u>Class C</u> fires involve electrical equipment, such as appliances, wiring, circuit breakers and outlets. Never use water to extinguish class C fires the risk of electrical shock is far too great! Class C extinguishers do not have a numerical rating. The C classification means the extinguishing agent is non-conductive. Geometric symbol (blue circle)
- <u>Class D</u> fire extinguishers are commonly found in a chemical laboratory. They are for fires that involve combustible metals, such as magnesium, titanium, potassium and sodium. These types of extinguishers also have no numerical rating, nor are they given a multi-purpose rating they are designed for class D fires only. Geometric symbol (Yellow Decagon)
- <u>Class K</u> fire extinguishers are for fires that involve cooking oils, trans-fats, or fats in cooking appliances and are typically found in restaurant and cafeteria kitchens. Geometric symbol (black hexagon)

There are also different chemical applications when you get into commercial settings. Frequently, nitrogen is used to flood below grade areas in petroleum and computer chip manufacturing.



Halon is used to flood computer rooms where there is a lot of sensitive electrical equipment where they only want to extinguish the isolated fire and not destroy all of the equipment. There are also foam systems that can be used to deluge specific areas. I'm sure there are others as technology and chemical engineering is always looking for the next better process to extinguish a fire in an efficient manner.

Some fires may involve a combination of these classifications. Your fire extinguishers should have ABC ratings on them.

Here are the most common types of fire extinguishers:

- Water extinguishers or APW extinguishers (air-pressurized water) are suitable for class A fires only. Never use a water extinguisher on grease fires, electrical fires or class D fires the flames will spread and make the fire bigger! Water extinguishers are filled with water and are typically pressurized with air. Again water extinguishers can be very dangerous in the wrong type of situation. Only fight the fire if you're certain it contains ordinary combustible materials only.
- **Dry chemical** extinguishers come in a variety of types and are suitable for a combination of **class A, B** and C fires. These are filled with foam or powder and pressurized with nitrogen.
 - **BC** This is the regular type of dry chemical extinguisher. It is filled with sodium bicarbonate or potassium bicarbonate. The BC variety leaves a mildly corrosive residue which must be cleaned immediately to prevent any damage to materials.
 - **ABC** This is the multipurpose dry chemical extinguisher. The ABC type is filled with monoammonium phosphate, a yellow powder that leaves a sticky residue that may be damaging to electrical appliances such as a computer



Dry chemical extinguishers have an advantage over CO2 extinguishers since they leave a non-flammable substance on the extinguished material, reducing the likelihood of re-ignition.

• Carbon Dioxide (CO2) extinguishers are used for class B and C fires. CO2 extinguishers contain carbon dioxide, a non-flammable gas, and are highly pressurized. The pressure is so great that it is not uncommon for bits of dry ice to shoot out the nozzle. They don't work very well on class A fires because they may not be able to displace enough oxygen to put the fire out, causing it to re-ignite.

CO2 extinguishers have an advantage over dry chemical extinguishers since they don't leave a harmful residue - a good choice for an electrical fire on a computer or other favorite electronic device such as a stereo or TV.

It is vital to know what type of extinguisher you are using. Using the wrong type of extinguisher for the wrong type of fire can be life-threatening.

These are only the common types of fire extinguishers. There are many others to choose from. Base your selection on the classification and the extinguisher's compatibility with the items you wish to protect. Read about the <u>Benefits and Applications of an Automatic Fire Extinguishers</u>.



Relaxed Learning Session: I'm new to Amateur Radio! Now what?! (from the toledo mobile radio association (TMRA) weekly announcements)

Join Toledo Mobile Radio Association Members at Maumee Fire Station #2 for a learning and Q&A session that should work to help newer Amateur Radio operators get started with some of the practical items that we all wish we knew when starting off in Ham Radio. :

This is going to be a very relaxed learning session which is a great place to get to know TMRA members and for newer amateur radio operators to ask questions related to items they are concerned about. (going more in depth than the class when/if needed)

We'll discuss and help newer hams resolve some of the typical early ham radio challenges including (but not limited to) the following types of discussion items (no specific order);

- 1. Answer any early questions and discuss list of items that we all have soon after becoming a ham. (and worries that we each had)

- 4. Discuss Effective Radiated Power in terms of Antenna benefits Discuss types of antennas indoor/outdoor options (and why). Horizontal vs. Vertical antennas.
- 5. Types of feed line and what you will need (and for what) and where to find it.
- 6. VHF/UHF vs HF Who can I talk to and when?
- 7. Discuss using local Repeaters, internet linked repeaters, PL Tones, (repeater book/radio reference),
- 8 . Discuss Simplex vs Repeater typical etiquette (just so you know) Examples: Q signals, calling CQ, breaks, etc.
- 9. First Contacts what to expect (most important, you won't be judged so don't "sweat it".... really...)
- 10. Hamfests + Ham Conventions. Why bother?
- 11. Where should I buy equipment and what are the risks?
- 12. Useful websites

- 13. Foxhunting and Satellites how/where?
- 14. Where to find manuals and information?
- 15. If there is time: Antenna Analyzers and SWR Meters what are they and when do I need one?
- 16. If there is time: N vs PL-259, vs SMA, versus BNC connectors
- 17. Benefits of organizations/clubs
- 18. Foxhunts what are they and how does it work? Do I need anything?
- 19. HF club events (what can I participate with?) Operating events.

This year's theme for the Dayton Hamvention is "AMATEUR RADIO.... SERVING THE COMMUNITY"



Continuing the tradition and in harmony with this year theme, Dayton Hamvention will once again have a setup and display of emergency communications vehicles, an "ECOMM TRUCK RALLEY". The purpose of the display is to promote emergency communications and for groups who build and operate mobile communications facilities to display their equipment and demonstrate their capabilities it's also a chance for the groups to talk about how to develop emergency communications in the field and to exchange ideas with Hamvention visitors.

This is a great opportunity to share your concepts, designs, ideas, layout and equipment for mobile emergency communication in the field and to give others ideas on designing their own unit or updating their existing unit!

We have had displays as simple as a pop up tent to RV style operations. We have had displays from local groups, out of state hospital support teams, Salvation Army, Civil Air Patrol, MARS, DHS and many others.

There will be a meet and greet and "review of the troops" during the event with emergency communications leaders and managers from the ARRL, ARES, MARS and others. This would be a great time to explain your display and your emergency communications program.

It is recommended that your organization have information such as handout or flyers. Also take lots of pictures for possible publication.

There are a few basic rules:

- Setup will be on Thursday May 17, 2018 anytime during the day. Before/ afterhours arrivals by appointment.
- Display area will be in the parking lot of 2017 Hamvention tents.
- Vehicles will not be allowed to leave the display area during active Hamvention hours, but may be driven out after hours.
- Electricity hookups may not be available or some distance away. Bring long extension cords.
- No noisy generators such as construction site type above 65db noise level
- Selling/flee market out of displays prohibited.
- No holes or damage to the blacktop. If you have to use jacks or stabilizers they should have a large footprint or use a 2" thick wooden pad sufficient to distribute the weight of the vehicle.

Hamvention has offered up to four (4) gate passes that allows you entry into the entire Hamvention which are also eligible for the door prizes and one (1) parking pass to the display unit.

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FCC Commissioner Mignon Clyburn Stepping Down

(from arrl bulletins)

FCC Commissioner Mignon Clyburn is leaving the Commission. She announced at the FCC's April 17 meeting that it would be her last as a commissioner. She plans to leave before the Commission's next scheduled meeting on May 10. Following her 2013 appointment by President Barack Obama, Clyburn served as acting FCC chair, the first woman to head the agency. A Democrat, she is currently serving a second term on the Commission.

FCC Chairman Ajit Pai congratulated Clyburn on "her distinguished tenure at the FCC," calling her "a tremendous leader and a committed public servant."



The other Democrat on the FCC, Jessica Rosenworcel, said, "Commissioner Clyburn is a dynamo. She represents the best of public service. I am proud to call her both a colleague and a friend." The majority of the five-member Commission represents the political party of the president.

According to POLITICO, Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer has already recommended to the White House Geoffrey Starks, an assistant chief in the FCC Enforcement Bureau, to nominate for Clyburn's seat.
