

FCC Marks 84th Anniversary

(from arrl bulletins)



The Federal Communications Commission turned 84 years old on June 19, the FCC tweeted. The FCC came into being in 1934 as an independent agency of the federal government when Congress passed the Communications Act of 1934, abolishing the Federal Radio Commission (FRC) — created in 1912 after the Titanic disaster — and transferring jurisdiction over radio licensing — including Amateur Radio licensing — to the new FCC.

According to its website, the FCC "regulates interstate and international communications by radio, television, wire, satellite, and cable in all 50 states, the

District of Columbia, and US territories," and it implements and enforces US communications law and regulations. The FCC is composed of five commissioners appointed by the president, who must undergo confirmation by the US Senate. The president designates one member as the FCC chairman. — Thanks to Bob Weinstock, W3RQ

ARES® Continues Move Toward Enhanced Training, Paperless Reporting

As part of upgrades to the ARES® program, ARRL will phase out traditional hard-copy report forms later this year in favor of an online system, <u>ARES® Connect</u> — a new volunteer management, communication, and reporting system. The system, in beta testing since March in four ARRL sections with large ARES organizations, will allow ARES members to log information for ARRL Field Organization handling but does not change how ARES serves partner organizations. ARES training also is due for enhancement.



At the Hamvention®ARRL Membership Forum in May, Great Lakes Division Director Dale Williams, WA8EFK, who chairs the ARRL Public Service Enhancement Working Group, discussed dramatic changes occurring among agencies in the emergency/disaster response sector and the transition to *ARES Connect*. In his presentation, "ARES Advances into the 21st Century — a New Program, a New Mission," Williams outlined the vision for an ARES comprised

of organized, trained, qualified, and credentialed Amateur Radio operators who can provide public service partners with radio communication expertise, capability, and capacity.

Goals include aligning the ARES organizational structure with the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Incident Command System (ICS). Emergency Coordinators (ECs) will continue to lead local ARES teams during an incident, with support from District and Section Emergency Coordinators.

Changes would encompass additional mandatory training to include ARRL Emergency Communications courses and the now-standard FEMA NIMS/ICS courses IS-100, 200, 700, 800, with IS-300 and 400 for higher levels. Other specialty training could include SKYWARN and agency-specific programs.

Training levels attained would dovetail with three new levels of ARES participation: Level One would be comprised of all entering the program with no training, while progressing through the ARRL emergency communications training and the FEMA Independent Study courses 100, 200, 700, and 800.

Level Two would be attained upon successful completion of these courses, and would be considered the "Standard" level for ARES participants. Level Three would be attained upon completion of the advanced FEMA courses IS 300 and 400, which would qualify candidates for ARES leadership positions.

Level One participants would be able to fulfill most ARES duties, with a target of attaining Level Two in 1 year. Level Two, the standard participant level, would permit participant access to most incident sites and emergency operations centers (EOCs). Level Three would convey full access as granted by the authority having jurisdiction, plus qualification for ARES leadership.

It's been proposed that ARRL provide a basic ARES ID, which would convey recognition of registration with ARES nationally and indicate level of training but convey no guarantee of site access. The authority having jurisdiction in an incident could grant an additional ID/pass for site access.

The ARRL Headquarters staff is undergoing training in *ARES Connect* administration, with group registration under way and IDs assigned. ARES-related publications also are being updated, along with an ARES strategic plan and introductory announcement. An article on ARES enhancements — once they have been approved by the ARRL Board of Directors — is set to appear in the September 2018 issue of *QST*. — *Thanks to Rick Palm, K1CE*/<u>ARES E-Letter</u>

The Ohio Section has already been given the "GREEN" light to start registrations. Everyone in ARES will need to get registered into the ARES Connect system in order for their volunteer time to be logged.



EMA in Columbiana County Graded Perfect In Nuclear Response Drill

The scenario for this year's drill involved an earthquake that did not result in any damage to the two nuclear reactors. As with all drills, other scenarios are interjected as the drill moves forward, with participants graded on how they respond to the changing conditions.

There was lots of action for the radio room with injects from the evaluators. We had separate evaluated drills for 3 days at 6 locations around the county. The overall drill sequence took 18 separate training, dry run, walk thru, and drill events over a 3-month period to accomplish the results, and Amateur Radio was at all of them!

According to FEMA Region 5 we hit 100% on our evaluated items. "My preliminary finding is everyone did great," said Sean O'Leary from FEMA's regional office in Chicago. O'Leary was impressed that of the 330 drill participants in the county, 100 were volunteers, "which we find is fantastic because it really shows the community is prepared," he said.

As most of you know, Ohio was chosen as one of four test Sections in the country. Why? Well, that's easy. We are a very active Section and Headquarters knows it! We were also the first to get activated in the new system. We are now up and running. If you haven't registered yet, now is the time. Go to: https://arrl.volunteerhub.com/lp/oh/ and get yourself registered now.

Now, once this new system is adopted by the ARRL Board of Directors next month, it will be the new way of operating in ARES from that point forward. I've been hammering on you for a very long time now so that you would be prepared for when this day comes, and as you can see, it will be coming very soon! The changes to the NEW ARES program are dramatic, but they are easily obtained. You just have to be willing to LEARN a little.

Why do we need these changes? That's easy, let me break it down this way, 4 years ago (2014) during the 100th Anniversary of the ARRL, we told Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in an agreement that we signed with them, that we would help out with communications in disasters.

They stated that they would be willing to accept our help, but only if we agreed to training. So, with that knowledge in my pocket, I started on a campaign to make sure that NO ONE in Ohio would be left behind or forgotten about. We started with the E.C. and D.E.C. appointments and required them to have, or quickly obtain the training as part of their acceptance to their appointment.

In 2016 we were involved with the federal government and many served agencies for the Republican National Convention and the NAACP National Convention. We were told then and there that we HAD TO HAVE this, and even additional NIMS training, in order for us to participate. It wasn't just us as hams either, EVERYONE involved with these projects had to have the training. And that made me see just how important this was to our future with all of our served government agencies.

So, at the beginning of 2017 we ramped up that training requirement for individuals that wanted to work inside our government served agencies, feeling that the need to understand Incident Command is absolutely needed. Now, it's not without consideration for how this impacts all of you and your volunteer time. So, let me take a quote from the NIMS Training Guide as to who **should** have the training.

Q: Who should take NIMS and ICS training?

A: Everyone involved in emergency management (to include emergency operation center personnel in support of the field), regardless of discipline or level of government, should take the NIMS baseline curriculum courses (Independent Study-700 and ICS-100). The NIC recommends that only individuals with a command and general staff role take advanced ICS courses. Fulfilling the training associated with this plan helps emergency management organizations, departments and agencies to develop preparedness capabilities for effective and efficient incident management. As a result, trained emergency responders are available as mutual aid to support incident management in other jurisdictions, if requested. The NIMS Training Program should sustain a personnel qualification system that is coordinated, maintained and meets the needs of the emergency management community.

As the above states. **Everyone** that is involved in support of the field! That's us folks!!

Now, don't forget that your ICS certificates aren't the only things we're looking for either. If you have Basic First Aid, CPR or AED training, it's also very valuable in the field as well. And, don't forget about the newest training out there, "Stop the Bleed..." This one is really good, and it's something that you can use no matter where you are. These courses are not only useful for you in the field, but you'd be surprised how they can help you around the house as well. Remember, most accidents happen within 25 miles of you home! And YES, my accident last year happened within that 25-mile radius. You need to be prepared!

Here's the figures as Jim, W8ERW has given them to me... Members in the database – **949**; Active members – **916**; Members NIMS complete -**707**; Total courses logged - **6,614**; 2017 training courses – **785**; 2018 training courses - 411 These numbers just keep growing. And we want them to continue for sure!

Don't forget, and an enticement to get your certificates to me I'm giving away to the 725th person, an ARRL ARES Mesh Vest! We aren't all that far away from number! Will you be the person that gets it?

That's going to do it this time around... I'll catch you on down the log for sure, and stay dry my friends!!
