

International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend Welcomes First-Time Lights

Marking its 21st anniversary this year, the International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend (ILLW) in August will celebrate Amateur Radio operation at several lighthouses that will make debut appearances in this year's event. So far, 300 groups or individuals have registered to indicate plans to participate from a lighthouse or lightship during the 2-day operating activity. Newcomers joining the list of perennials include the Ashdod and Mount Carmel lighthouses in Israel; Shabla Lighthouse in Bulgaria; Porthcawl Breakwater in Wales, and Tanjung Datu in Malaysia. Additional newcomers are in Mexico and Cuba, sponsors said.

ILLW is always held on the third full weekend in August. This year, it will get under way at 0001 UTC on **August 18 and continue until 2400 on August 19 — 48 hours in all**. The ILLW typically attracts more than 500 lighthouse entries in dozens of countries. Registration is not required for participation, but it does let other stations know which lighthouses and lightships will be activated.

Other lighthouses making a first appearance in ILLW include Malarrif in Iceland and Akmanrags Lighthouse in Latvia. The Lightship Huron on the St Clair River in Michigan also is a newcomer.

As the ILLW website notes, "August seems to have become the international weekend for lighthouses." In the US, August 7 in National Lighthouse Day, which is marked by Amateur Radio operations at lighthouses during US National Lighthouse Week. In Britain, the Association of Lighthouse Keepers conducts International Lighthouse Heritage Weekend during the third full weekend in August, coinciding with ILLW.

Sponsors stress that the event is *not* a contest — and there are no prizes, certificates, or other enticements to participate. Each station's operators decide how they will operate their station with respect to bands and modes, and participating stations do not have to be on the air for the entire weekend.

Activity does not need to take place inside the structure itself. A Field Day-style setup at the light or other building adjacent to the light is sufficient. Sponsors say the intent of that requirement is to make the station visible to visitors.

Columbus TV Stations Signals Due to Relocate

(Information obtained in part from Tim Feran at the Columbus Dispatch on June 8, 2018 and the ATCO Newsletter)

Over-the-air TV owners with antennas must get ready to rescan their television set. Within the next few years nearly 1,000 TV stations around the country, including four in Columbus, are voluntarily moving their current broadcast channel to another channel in a transition process.

The four Columbus stations moving are:

- Channel 34 WOSU-TV will move to channel 16 from channel 38
- Channel 28 WTTE-TV will move to channel 27 from channel 36

- Channel 6 WSYX-TV will move to channel 28 from channel 48
- Channel 17 WDEM-CD will move to channel 24 from channel 17
- Channel 10 WBNS will remain on channel 21
- Channel 4 WCMH will remain on channel 14

The transition will take place in phases over the next two or so years as stations add new transmitters and erect new antennas. WTTE and WDEM are scheduled to transition by April ??? (That can't be right. WTTE and WSYX are located on the same tower) while WOSU and WSYX are scheduled to make the transition in early 2020.

The stations that are changing channels will notify consumers with daily on-air announcements for at least 30 days prior to any change.

Digital technology has meant that many TV stations already have been on channels that don't correspond to their familiar old numbers. But viewers didn't realize it because translators in digital TV sets have allowed those old numbers to appear onscreen, just as they always have.

The change is happening because the Federal Communications Commission held an auction from March 2016 through March 2017 in which TV broadcasters voluntarily gave up their current broadcast channels in exchange for a share of the financial proceeds from the auction.

The FCC held the auction so that commercial wireless service providers can have the necessary capacity to provide faster mobile broadband services.

Wireless providers ponied up \$19.8 billion in the auction, of which \$10.05 billion went to stations that were giving up their frequencies. More than \$7 billion from the auction is to be deposited to the U.S. Treasury for deficit



Youth DX Adventure Update

The Curacao 2018 Dave Kalter youth dx adventure of PJ2Y went QRT at 5:45 pm EDT on Monday July 23. The youths made 6261 QSO's starting Thursday evening at 7:30 pm EDT and ran until QRT time. There was a concentrated effort to have a FT8 station on the air as much as possible. Also, there were 2 additional radios on the air almost constantly. One was was on SSB, and the other alternated between SSB and CW. All CW QSO's were made by the youth. The adults only made a few SSB and FT8 contacts, as the youth were quite active on the radios.

We had a few challenges. During prime band opening time on two of the days we had power losses resulting in lost time. This amounted to about 8 hours. The youth chose to do their sightseeing on Monday to permit contacts on Sunday while people were off for the weekend. Each operating day we didn't see bands open until about 10 and they usually operated until midnight when most bands closed for us.

The team was very compatible and work extremely well together. We thank all of our sponsors and especially all those who contacted us. The multiple contacts on a band were great, as usually it was a different one of the youth. I know several people tried to work all kids (WAK) on not only one but more than one band.

The QSO card will be designed and printed soon. See our PJ2Y QRZ page for more information. The entire log has been loaded to LoTW and ClubLog. At this time, we do not plan to do OQRS.

On September 1, 2018 something new will be coming to an Ohio library near you. The website **LinkedIn Learning** is partnering with Ohio's public libraries to provide free online training to anyone who holds a valid Ohio public library card.

This experiment, currently scheduled for three years, will make 6,600 online courses available to those card holders. Of special interest to ARES members may be the hundreds and hundreds of computer courses. Programming languages, IT subjects, computer aided design and many other topics are available now for a monthly fee, but in September the Ohio public library network will begin to cover all costs.
