DMR Infuses Fun Onto A Recently New Ham

Cynthia, KE8DPC, earned her technician license in 2016, but she did not know what to do with her license after passing the test.

She was like most new U.S. amateur radio operators who learned the questions and answers to earn her FCC privileges.

As we move forward a year later, Cynthia was introduced to Digital Mobile Radio by this writer in December of 2016, is active on DMR, and keeps asking, "When is the next net?"



Cynthia's knowledge of amateur radio has grown exponentially since getting on DMR and listening more that talking. She participates on the Texas Tech Net (Texas Statewide TG3148) on Tuesdays at 8 p.m. ET, and the Ohio Net (Ohio Statewide TG3139) on Wednesdays at 8:30 p.m. ET.

"It is very easy for me to do check ins. As far as participating in discussions, I don't feel knowledgeable enough to join (in). Maybe one day," Cynthia said. She also noted, "DMR is crisp and clear and analog is scratchy and noisy."

Being a member of various amateur radio Facebook pages including "Ohio DMR," Cynthia routinely references radio information and comments from internet sources. "I learn something new almost every day."

In the relatively short time Cynthia has been licensed, she has become a pro at speaking on those nets in part to her having an FAA Private Pilot's certificate where she learned to talk to air traffic controllers and other pilots with a radio.

Cynthia's fascination with diverse technology came from what she witnessed of what computers could do for her.

In attempting to update her pilot's logbook totals prior to Private Pilot Practical Test, Cynthia learned that her logbook would be more accurate and the totals updated instantaneously by using a spreadsheet program. She had that "wow" look to her because of the computer, and ran out that very week to purchase a computer and get on the internet.

Prior to earning her amateur radio license, she attended hamfests and got to know some of people who attended. She would always notice someone with a handheld radio and wondered how those with a "little radio" could communicate with other people miles away. She had used Family Radio Service equipment in the past, but it did not have nearly the range of what the people at the hamfests were using.

Cynthia, KE8DPC, checks in on the Tuesday evening Texas Tech Net. "I always enjoyed talking on radios starting with the Family Radio Service radios. It is nice to hold a conversation with someone without relying on a telephone," said Cynthia. "It is amazing that my little (DMR) hand held radio can communicate with other amateurs across the United States and foreign countries."



She went on to say, "I like the enthusiasm I hear from other operators. It is like a kinship. I am always learning. For each question I find an answer to, I find three more questions that need answers."

"Never stop learning and never stop asking questions," she said, and with her on-air training, "I may actually be able to help someone someday."

Cynthia is one out of about 69 females (YLs) who has a DMR ID, and YLs represent 5.04 percent of the 1,370 individual DMR users in Ohio as of September 11, 2017.

According to the Amateur Radio Relay

League published license count as recent as September 10, the technician license class in Ohio numbered 12,872 out of 27,982 total amateur radio licenses. The technician is 46 percent of all the licensed amateur radio operators in the state of Ohio.

Caribbean Emergency Weather Network Handling High Volume of Post-Storm Traffic (from ARRL Bulletines)



The Caribbean Emergency and Weather Network (CEWN) on 7.188 and 3.815 MHz continues actively handling emergency and priority traffic in the wake of Hurricane Maria — especially for Dominica and Puerto Rico but for any storm-affected area in the Caribbean where storm damage was severe. A YouTube live stream is available, compliments of ARRL Santa Barbara Section Technical Advisor Ben Kuo, AI6YR — who has no official connection with CEWN. Kuo said the net is handling "real life-and-death traffic in Dominica," including a situation involving someone with a broken leg and trapped in a house.

"Truly I think that the regional agencies were not ready for a calamity of this magnitude," said Kumar Persaud, J85K, one of the CEWN net controllers. "The CEWN operators have ended up filling the communications gap for the agencies, without any prior briefing."

The net is dealing with a tremendous volume of traffic for Dominica and Puerto Rico, he told ARRL, with a handful of stations handling emergency and priority communications for a million or more people. The CEWN said that at this time, its operators are unable to deal with health-and-welfare traffic.

The CEWN is handling <u>health-and-welfare inquiries</u> via e-mail. Requesters should indicate your name and location and the name and location of the person(s) they're trying to locate, plus an e-mail address or telephone number for a response.

On September 21, the net experienced what Kuo described as deliberate interference. Dominica suffered a direct hit by Hurricane Maria on September 18-19, resulting in a loss of all power and a total blackout of communication to the outside world, except for Amateur Radio. Kuo said stations in Puerto Rico also report having no power, telephone service, or water and "everything devastated."

Kuo cited hams on St. Lucia and on Dominica, and others outside the region, for coordinating and collecting inbound health-and-welfare traffic as well as coordinating the landing of the emergency relief vessels from Barbuda and advising rescue groups on logistics.

The net also has been an only communication path for government communication. "For the public, the only link to information on their families in Dominica was a Facebook broadcast of an *EchoLink* node to the island by Brian Machesny, K1LI/J75Y," Kuo said.

"That node — on St. Lucia — allowed hams to monitor traffic in Dominica on the local J73MAN repeater." Because of poor HF band conditions, no propagation was available to the US, but the J69DS remote station provided direct access from St. Lucia to nets on 80 and 40 meters, he said.

The J69DS <u>RemoteHams</u> server is on listening to the CEWN on HF, and *EchoLink*(J62DX node) is on the UHF repeater in Dominica. Do *not* transmit unless you have valid traffic for the net.

JOTA 2017 Organizers Urge Scout Stations to Register Now

Scouting's Jamboree on the Air/Jamboree on the Internet (JOTA/JOTI) event takes place over the October 20-22 weekend, and organizers are urging Scout stations planning to participate to <u>register</u> now. The world JOTA-JOTI team has activated its online sign-up system.

"Our number one message at this time is to register their station and get ready for <u>JOTA</u>," JOTA Coordinator Jim Wilson, K5ND, told ARRL.
"It's time for Scout groups to bring together their open action items -ordering patches, printing handouts, gathering equipment, reminding staff members, verifying location, and getting the word out to the Scouts to be prepared for a fabulous experience talking with other Scouts across the country and hopefully around the world."

JOTA is the world's largest Scouting event, held annually over the third full weekend in October, and Scouts of any age can participate -- from Cub Scouts to Boy Scouts and Venturers, male and female. During JOTA, Amateur Radio links Scouts with other Scouts and hams, locally and worldwide. Since the first JOTA in 1958, millions of Scouts have met each other through this event to exchange ideas and share



experiences via ham radio. Many contacts made during JOTA have resulted in enduring friendships and connections.

According to the World Scout Bureau, the 2016 JOTA had nearly 1.3 million Scout participants from more than 30,000 locations, and reached 156 countries.

The World JOTA-JOTI team has published a <u>Participant's Guide</u> to help Scouts to get on the air and the internet for the largest Scouting event in the world. They've also published a brief history of the <u>60 years of Jamboree on the Air</u> as well as the <u>Top 10 Challenges and Activities in 2016</u> that might provide ideas for your event this year. An <u>online scheduling tool</u> is available too.

For participating via *EchoLink*, two conference nodes now have been designated for Scout contacts -- *JOTA-365* (node 480809) and *JAMBO* (node 832996). Visit the K2BSA Radio Scouting page for more information on frequencies, including D-STAR, DMR, and IRLP.
