For the last several months I've been telling you about the Amateur Radio Meet and Greet Potluck multi club event. Well it was held Sunday, August 4, in the Cottonwood Picnic Area of the Cleveland MetroParks. It was a smashing success with beautiful weather and attendance in the mid-40s. There were hams from at least six different area clubs from three different counties. The food was wonderful and there was plenty of it. The system of suggesting what category of food to bring (appetizer, main dish, side dish, dessert, etc.) by the initial of the last name worked very well to provide an even distribution of foods.

Then there were the prizes in the bag raffle, at least 12 of them. Just off the top of my head; there were two antennas, a kid's toy basket, a gift card to DX Engineering, a nice sized LiFePO battery, a Diamond 40-amp power supply, and a cash bag with \$76 in it. Come to think of it, being under a rock might have been a good place to be. I was sitting at my computer when the weather alert on my cell phone went off warning of a possible tornado. gusts and the lights going off and back on. Then, there was a loud Bzzzzz-Bang sound and the lights were out for good.

I decided to go outside to see if I could see anything. I figured that if I saw a tornado or heard the characteristic freight train sound I was just a few feet from the house and basement door. Then again, the images of TV weathermen standing in pouring rain and hanging on to a pole in high winds while talking about how dangerous it is came to mind. That and the videos of the guy trying to video a tornado while his family is begging him to get in the cellar. Of course I'm not that dumb.

At one point, it wasn't raining that much but it seemed to be coming horizontally from multiple directions at once. There is a pine tree in my neighbor's yard, about 80 to 100 feet tall. They also have pop-up cabana that is securely staked to the ground. I saw the top of the tree start to whip around in a circular motion. While that was happening, the cabana started to shake violently. Then the cabana took off straight up for about 40 feet. It paused for a second and came straight down; landing in the same space it left from.

Later, my neighbor came out, pointed to some shingles in his backyard, and was wondering where they came from. I figured out that we lost two rows of shingles from the other side of our garage roof and that is what landed in the neighbor's yard. Still, compared to many, we were pretty lucky. Later when the NWS showed the paths of the tornados, it looked to me as though the track of the one that wreaked destruction in Parma may have passed over us but had not yet touched down.

We were without commercial power for two days. But, about six years ago I bought a Harbor Freight Predator 3500 Inverter generator. Except for periodic testing as recommended, it has seen almost no real use. Even with five to six year old gas, it started on the first pull and ran beautifully for more than 48 hours. They rate it to run for 11 hours on a tank (2.6 gallons) of gas under 25%

load. I figure we were getting about 16 to 17 hours on that much gas. I ran one extension cord into the basement to power the sump pump and another to the kitchen and dining room for the refrigerator, microwave, and computer and monitor. I have lots of portable LED lights, so that was not a problem.

The one complaint I have is with Verizon. Every year or so, our cell service at the house goes out. I can travel a half mile away and get fine service. Immediately after the storm, it was working, but a bit slow. However, over the next few hours, it degraded and then stopped. The next day I had voice service back, so I tried calling them. It was a frustrating hour and a half to get a real person on the phone. He was able to tell me that they had lots of complaints from my area and that the tower which serves my area was not working. He even told me where that tower is located. About six hours later cell service came back. I found it scary to be without phone or internet service. Lacking internet is annoying, but I worry if we had a medical emergency or fire, how would we get help?

Anyway, I hope you came through the storm without major incident and we will see you at the next meeting.

Foxhunting: The Northern Ohio Amateur Radio Society (NOARS) has been running monthly hidden transmitter hunts in the MetroParks and western suburbs. They would like to expand them and get more hunters from adjoining areas. I'd like to hear from you as to what it would take to get you to come out and participate. If you are interested, contact me. Until next month, talk on the radio and use the repeaters. Check into one of the many nets available on the LEARA repeaters. Join us on the air, online, or in person. If you don't feel safe meeting in person, we understand. But, we really want to see or at least hear from you, even if it is only by radio or Zoom.

Calling all Northeast Ohio Amateur Radio Operators. You are invited to join us on the air on **September 11th from 4:30 to 7:30 PM local time (2030 to 2330 UTC)**. The activity is designed to include all hams, regardless of license class. The bands and modes (2 M, 70cm & 6 M FM and 6 M & 10M SSB) are chosen to cover radios that most Amateurs already have and operating privileges of all hams, including Technicians. You can choose to work one or all modes/band combinations.

Setting up can be as simple or complex as you like- Using your handheld, driving your vehicle with mobile radio/antennas, or setting up a portable station with gain antennas. You can also activate multiple park locations if you want to be a rover.

Sponsored by the Cuyahoga Falls Amateur Radio Club (CFARC), the event uses the Summit County Metro Parks as the setting. Still, you can also participate from your home station if you are within range. With 39 possible locations, including parks and trailheads, there are plenty of choices. If you are a dedicated POTA operator, some of the parks are also part of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Although sponsored by CFARC, the event is open to all Hams, regardless of club affiliation.

If you are in Summit County, pick out your nearby park or plan to operate from home and join us on the air. If you are from outside the county, take a short drive and enjoy autumn in one of the parks while you operate. Maybe even plan a hike before operations begin. There is also a random drawing for a \$50 Gift Certificate for DX Engineering for all participants who make at least five contacts and submit an entry.

ARRL Urges Protecting the Amateur Radio 902-928 MHz Band

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) accepted for public comment a Petition for Rulemaking filed by NextNav Inc., a licensee in the 900-MHz Location and Monitoring Service (LMS), to completely reconfigure the 902-928 MHz band and replace the LMS with high-powered 5G cellular and related location services.

•••

The new nationwide license would authorize NextNav to provide much higher-powered traditional broadband and 5G cellular services as well as the related location service occupying 15 of the total 26 megahertz available in the band. The reconfiguration proposed by NextNav would create a 5-megahertz-wide uplink subband at 902-907 MHz paired with a 10-megahertz downlink subband at 918-928 MHz. The 5-megahertz uplink subband would be limited to use by mobiles with a maximum of 3 watts ERP. On the 10-megahertz downlink subband, up to 2000 watts ERP would be permitted in rural areas and 1000 watts ERP in urban and suburban areas, radiating from tower structures that could reach

1000 or more feet above average terrain. These configurations reflect the FCC's rules for standard cellular configurations that have been adopted to govern a number of other bands used for similar 5G and like services.

ARRL is preparing comments urging protection of existing and future amateur uses in this band. ARRL urges all amateurs to study the proposal and file their own comments describing their activities in this band and the expected effect of the proposed changes. The filing deadline is September 5, 2024. Replies to comments are due by September 20, 2024.
