## Notes on the Shed Repair

Thanks to everyone for their thoughtful questions about the future of the storage shed for QCEN, located at the VND site in Finneytown.

We have a hard-working shed committee made up of Don Mortimer KE8WYK, Jim Craycroft KB8UCJ, and Bob Bross W8NFM. At the September 2024 general QCEN meeting, it was decided to study the issue of the shed damage to determine whether the shed should be fixed or replaced. The members of this committee were charged with gathering information about the shed and presenting their findings to the club. At the November 2024 general meeting, the shed committee reported that, based on their assessment, the cost to replace the shed would be approximately \$2,500. At the January meeting there was a lengthy discussion and a consensus was reached to repair the existing shed instead of replacing it. At the April meeting it was decided to hold a work date in May to determine the cost of the repair and at the May meeting that date was set for May 31.

On May 31, Don and Jim assessed the needed work and created an estimate of needed materials that totaled \$860.43. Spending of these funds will be voted on at the July 12 member meeting, held during the picnic.

Thanks again to the shed committee for their valuable input and efforts, and thanks to everyone for bringing your ideas and energy to the club.

### Bringing Ham Radio to the Communities

Em Rhodes N8MCR, president of QCEN, had the opportunity to speak about ham radio to the members of the Enright Ridge Urban Ecovillage located in Price Hill. The ecovillage is an intentional community focused on environmentally sustainable practices and strong community ties. The members wanted to learn more about how ham radio could help them to be resilient during major storms and natural disasters. Em gave a history of Red Cross disaster responses in the Cincinnati area and outlined the many ways that the QCEN radio club provided services during those disasters. With the help of Bob Bross, W8NFM, Em was able to demonstrate a live radio transmission from West Chester to Price Hill and show attendees how the repeater system can relay communication throughout the region. This led to a thoughtful discussion about how the community could tap into the network if even one of their members got their ham license. Other resources were discussed such as the Skywarn network and websites such as the Hurricane Watch Net (www.hwn.org). Em encouraged participation in ham radio classes and several people expressed interest. It was great fun to introduce Ham Radio to a new and interested audience.



#### Post-Field Day at W8VVL By Bob Bross, W8NFM

Thank you (and congratulations) to all who participated in Field Day 2025. Some participated from home; others visited one or more field sites; and then, there were those who operated from W8VVL at the Red Cross.

In a nutshell: band conditions were horrible this year. Thunderstorms in the surrounding area created significant noise across the board; hence, only the strongest signals could be heard. Despite the challenges, dedication to the task did yield results. While the overall number of contacts was lower than in the past, it clearly demonstrated the ability to overcome adverse conditions.

QCEN did have contacts on 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 meters; 40 meters also had three different modes: SSB, CW and Digital. Seven operators worked from W8VVL and another from home. We also had people come in to help in setup before and teardown afterward. On behalf of QCEN, we appreciate everyone who helped in whatever role they did.

#### Why Scan Call-In Frequencies? By Bob Bross, W8NFM

Many of us have scanners in our shack (and possibly in our vehicles as well.) Keeping up with what is going on in our area can be done by monitoring selected frequences; Law Enforcement and Fire/EMS are obvious ones, but several others can provide rare and unusual information.

121.5 MHz is the international aviation emergency frequency; 156.8 MHz is used for international maritime distress. In the Amateur VHF band, 145.80 MHz is the downlink from the International Space Station, where one can hear periodic conversations for special school and other scheduled broadcasts. Of course, 146.52 MHz is the US call-in frequency (which should be in all our radios anyway.)

A few weeks ago, Fred K8FR heard an unusual call on this last one from 7000 feet. It seems a local skydiver decided to take a portable rig with him and proceeded to make contacts on his way down. I am only guessing, but based on the rate he was stating his altitude, the communications were being made AFTER his parachute had been deployed (otherwise, the calls would have been VERY fast!)

It's worth listening in to these and other frequencies - you never know who might "drop in"!
